Mount Penn Preserve – Historical Snapshot

Encompassing an area of nearly 4,000 acres, The Mount Penn Preserve is a conglomeration of mostly wooded open space intermingled with residential properties, restaurants, iconic architecture and parks along with the remnants of buildings and places of recreation and enjoyment that have long vanished from the landscape. Mount Penn Preserve is stitched together by a sinuous network of roads and trails that have withstood the test of times and the sometimes questionable skills of motorists. Road cyclists race its hilly turns and automobile races are a part of the living history that is the Mount Penn Preserve. Today these roads are used to access the mountain, for pleasure driving, and to reach the popular public destinations such as the Pagoda, Fire Tower, Antietam Lake, and Mineral Springs Park. The many miles of trails draw mountain bikers from far distances and equestrians, hikers, runners, bird watchers and nature lovers of all types have their favorite trails.























Reading Liederkranz

In the late 1800's into the early 20th century, the gravity railroad carried tourists up the mountain for scenic views over the city and to visit the numerous eating and drinking establishments that dotted the mountain. Pendora Park and Carsonia Park were family amusement parks; Millar's Family Park Hotel, Schwatz's Summit House Hotel, Thomas Steigerwald's Winery, and the Bavarian Home are but a few businesses that attracted thousands of residents and tourists each year to their beloved Mount Penn. Today, Stokesay Castle, Reading Liederkranz and Mountain Springs Restaurant and Captain's Cove remain and enjoy enthusiastic patrons. Footprints on the Mountain -A History of the Pagoda, the Tower, the Gravity Railroad and Skyline Drive, by Corrie Crupi is a concise history of Mount Penn and a mustread to understand the colorful history of this remarkable place. It is interesting to get a sense of how many places of eating, drinking and entertainment there were on Mount Penn. In comparison to the late 19th and early 20th century, the mountain is "wilderness" today.

Industrialist Clinton F. Earl helped to make the mountain a "preserve" in the first third of the 20th century by purchasing parcels on the mountain as preserved open space. Major ownership of the mountain's public lands is divided amongst The City of Reading, Berks County, Berks Nature, Reading Water Authority, Mt. Penn Municipal Authority and the Reading School District. The lands fall within the City of Reading, Mount Penn Borough, Alsace Township and Lower Alsace Township.

Several non-profit and volunteer organizations have been established by area citizens concerned about preserving the history of the Mount Penn Preserve while making sure its landmarks and natural resources are protected for future generations of area residents and tourists. These include the Foundation for the Reading Pagoda, Pagoda Skyline Inc., Berks Area Mountain Biking Association (BAMBA), the Flying Dutchmen, Reading American Little League, Olivet Boys and Girls Club, and others. Typically, each organization has its own internal priorities that focus on a specific facility or part of the Mountain. The same holds true for the governmental organizations who own parts of the mountain. For example, Lower Alsace Township will be milling and repaving the length of Skyline Drive in the summer of 2017.

Purpose of the Mount Penn Preserve Master Plan

The Mount Penn Preserve Master Plan seeks to create a consensus vision for the future of this unique and irreplaceable regional resource.

Since at least the 1970's community organizations have partnered with local governments and worked towards preserving, restoring and enhancing the iconic architecture, roadways, trails and recreational facilities in the Mount Penn Preserve. Generally, both government and volunteer organizations have succeeded in this heroic endeavor. Many facilities have been renovated. Rotary Park's fields are meticulously maintained. City Park's magnificent Bandshell received a facelift a few years ago. The William Penn Memorial Fire Tower, while still needing repairs, looks amazing and remains a must-see destination on the Mountain. Berks County acquired Lake Antietam in 2006 and recently completed site improvements. Camp Lily continues to serve

a select clientele. Skyline Drive will be repaved in 2017, and BAMBA keeps maintaining and improving trails. However, despite these many successes, community leaders have concluded that this is an "up mountain" battle. With all governments facing dwindling resources, and non-profits competing for increasingly scarce donation dollars, a new more comprehensive and unified approach is needed toward restoring the magnificence of the Mount Penn Preserve.

In spring of 2015, community leaders, led by Berks County Commissioner Kevin Barnhardt and architect and activist Lee Olsen conducted a community meeting to introduce the idea and jump start this community-based initiative. Nearly 100 concerned citizens attended that meeting to express their concern for the Mountain and support for this initiative.

With a generous grant from the Reading-Berks Association of REALTORS®, a contribution from the Smart Growth Alliance of Berks County, through the National Association of REALTORS®, and matching contributions from the partner municipalities, the community retained Simone Collins Landscape Architecture to work with the


Reading community to formulate a master plan in order to create a vision for the future of the Mount Penn Preserve.

Through an intensive community planning process, the following goals emerged:

- 1) Create an organization structure to plan and coordinate activities, events, facility improvements and priorities in the Mount Penn Preserve.
- 2) Preserve and protect the natural, historic and man-made resources in the Mount Penn Preserve.
- 3) Plan and fund new public sector passive and active recreational facilities in Mount Penn Preserve.
- 4) Engage private-sector entrepreneurs and businesses to partner with local governments and non-profits to create new visitor amenities in the Mount Penn Preserve.

Master Plan Process and Schedule

The Master Plan community engagement process occurred over a roughly two month period from Feb 24 through April 20, 2017. Specific committee and public meeting dates are shown below.

Friday, February 24

9AM to noon – project area tour with steering committee members and executive committee members.

1 PM / 2 PM to 4 PM – programming and brainstorming session with executive committee and steering committee. Reading City Hall Chambers.

Public Opinion Survey ran from Feb. 24 to March 25

Saturday, February 25

Open house charrette 10 AM to 4 PM – analysis maps and plans on display; formal presentations at 11 AM and 2 PM. Develop program from community with brainstorming sessions. Reading City Hall Chambers.

Thursday, March 9

4PM to 6PM and 7PM to 9PM – Two identical meetings to present initial design concepts to the community. Attendees included the public and both the executive and steering committee. Based on feedback from meetings, the Consultant Team proceeded with the development of the Draft Master Plan. The meeting was held at Reading Liederkranz.





Regional Map

For planning purposes, the project area limits were set along major roadways that surround the mountain. This area is approximately 4,000 acres and in addition to the publically owned lands on the mountain, the study area also includes residential neighborhoods and private lands.

The Location Map shows that the Mount Penn Preserve enjoys easy access for the regional transportation routes and local roads. Easy access to the Preserve can be had from Rt. 422, Rt. 222, Rt. 12, Rt. 51, Rt. 562, and Rt. 153.

The Mount Penn Preserve is within easy distance for day trippers who wish to experience its attributes. Travel times from various locations to the Mount Penn Preserve are as follows:

Once you are on the Mountain, there are only a few roads that traverse it giving visitors the gift of feeling out in the wilderness. Sections of the Preserve seem far away and remote while some of the most beautiful and historic areas of the Preserve are in close proximity to residential neighborhoods.

Places Map


At its essence, the Mount Penn Preserve is an amalgamation of special places that create unique experiences and memories.

Each of these places holds a special meaning to each person who visits them. Life-long Reading-area residents recount riveting stories of their family's experiences in the Preserve. First time visitors are always amazed by the incredible views from the Pagoda or Fire Tower. Cyclists tackle the challenging inclines of the Mountain's roads, and who can forget attending Oktoberfest?

The Places Map inventories the most significant locations on the Mountain. These are the locations that have well-known and identifiable names. Many of these well-known locations have historic significance. Others are of more recent origin that were created or adapted to serve more recent recreational or open space needs. There are also favorite places for visitors that have no names, but hold meaning for many who frequent the mountain.

Natural Features

The Natural Features Map focuses on the topographic features of the Mount Penn Preserve. In terms of topography, areas that are relatively level or flat are in limited supply on the Mountain. These more level areas are important since if new activity areas or facilities are to be considered on the Mountain, these areas are more easily able to accommodate new facilities with the least negative impact to the mountain's natural resources. (Please note that some of the light green areas on the map are developed as residential properties. These are not proposed for Preserve open space or recreational use)

Ownership and Circulation

The Mount Penn Preserve public land ownership is divided amongst six (6) public entities. They are, in terms of most land ownership to the least land ownership:




Biking Association (BAMBA). In 2015, the International Mountain Biking Association (IMBA) designated the Greater Reading Area a Bronze Level Ride Center. This is one of only 37 ride centers worldwide. This designation is important in attracting enthusiasts from a wide area. BAMBA has a detailed trail map that rates trails for hiking and mountain biking in terms of difficulty.


Historic Features Map


The Mount Penn Preserve is steeped in rich history. There are many sites on the Mt. Penn Preserve that are recognized for their historic significance – and there are many more sites that are part of the cultural heritage of the Mountain and the community.

There are three National Historic Register sites. They are the Pagoda, the Lindbergh Viaduct and the Peter D. Wanner House. There are five sites that are eligible for listing on the National Historic Register. They are The Park Line Historic District; The Penn's Common Historic District; The Pendora Park Channel; the William Penn Memorial Firetower; and the Antietam Lake and Watershed and Oblinger Mill and Dam site.

The County of Berks also lists 168 sites or structures that have historic significance. They are located on the Historic Features Map and listed on the accompanying chart. These include well known locations such as Reading Liederkranz, Carsonia Park, Stokesay Castle, Thomas Steigerwalt Winery, Pennside Drive-In and many others.















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


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
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Relevant Planning Documents

Berks County Comprehensive Plan 2030

The Berks County Comprehensive Plan 2030, also referred to as Berks Vision, serves as an update to the 2003 Comprehensive Plan. The plan has recommendations and guides for growth and development within the County. It assists the Berks County Planning Commission in evaluating development proposals and requests for grants and financial assistance. The vision plan's recommendations include:

- Taking full advantage of the county's geographic location along major roadways connecting Berks County to the Philadelphia Region, Lehigh Valley, New York / New Jersey Metro Region, Lancaster, and Baltimore / Washington Metro Region;
- Continuing to protect its rich agricultural land and heritage while expanding its parks and trail systems; and
- Expanding use of new technology to link the County's economic, educational, and social institutions, as well as promoting smart growth policies and practices to accomplish these goals.

Mount Penn is called out in the Comprehensive Plan as a significant recreation area that includes land owned by both the City of Reading and Berks County. The Plan specifically states that regional cooperation between the City and County is important and should be enhanced in the future.

- Identify, preserve, and enhance the historic, architectural, and cultural resources of the Township and Borough; and
- Provide open space and recreation in Mount Penn and Lower Alsace by protecting and preserving Neversink Mountain, the Antietam Lake area, Antietam Creek, the Mount Penn Borough Municipal Authority Watershed, Earl Trust properties, Mount Penn, and remaining wooded, rural areas in the Township and by retaining and planning recreation areas.





Plan Recommendations

For organizational purposes the master plan divided the Mount Penn Preserve into five (5) use areas. They have been named for some of the most identifiable landmarks on the Mountain.

- 1. Skyline
- 2. Central Mountain
- 3. Antietam
- 4. Gravity Railroad
- 5. Mountain Village

There is also a recommendations list that is applicable mountain-wide. These improvements include items such as programming, activities, Preserve-wide plans and transportation improvements.

The Master Plan recommendations are listed in a matrix that categorizes each improvement as follows:

Recommendation number: 1.1, 1.2, 1.3, 2.1, 3.1, etc. These numbers correspond to the use areas and are keyed to locations on the individual use area maps.

Improvement type: These are categorized as follows:

- Physical improvement
- Programming
- Events
- Signage and Wayfinding

Recommendation and Description: Concise description of the recommendation

Priority: 1. High; 2. Medium; 3. Low These relative values will assist stakeholders to create a strategy for prioritization of the most important projects to undertake in each use area.

For example, high priority projects are sometimes those with a low cost that can be accomplished with a relatively modest investment. In other cases, high priorities are projects that will create a new amenity on the mountain that serves a new user group or introduces a new

activity or amenity into the Preserve.

Cost: Costs are divided into three categories:

- Low less than \$50,000.00. These projects are often planning or design studies or programmatic activities (such as periodic mountain trash clean ups) or activities or events paid for by the private sector (food trucks or seasonal restaurants), issuing requests for letters of interest (LOI) for projects by private sector entrepreneurs, or costs for additional annual recreational programming.
- Medium between \$50,000.00 and \$500,000.00. These projects are generally small to mid-size capital improvement projects or larger organizational and information management costs. Examples might be mulching toilets at trailheads, a new playground or the establishment of a dog park.
- High Greater than \$500,000.00. These are large capital projects. Examples include a new parking and outdoor use area at the Pagoda, or stairway connection from City Park to the Pagoda.

Most projects can also be phased to reduce costs in any one year.

Implementation or Action Timeline: Implementation is divided into three categories:

- Immediate Term: 0-3 years: These actions are those that can be carried out quickly, generally at "low" cost. Examples include:
 - Information management
 - Organizational / administrative tasks
 - Fund raising / grant application preparation / local government budgeting
 - Volunteer projects such as clean-up, trail repair, landscaping, etc.
 - Concept Design / Master Plans
 - Issue requests for Letters of Interest (LOI) to private sector businesses for amenity projects
 - Develop Request for Proposals (RFPs) for public sector projects
 - No Action for recommendations that will occur later in the implementation timetable.

- Mid Term: 3-8 years: These actions either rely on immediate term completed work or are the initiation of lower priority projects. Examples include:
 - Completion of facility master plans for public sector improvement projects, obtaining grant funding for construction and in some cases construction of phase 1 improvements
 - Negotiations with private sector entrepreneurs for completion of private sector amenities. Project financing and construction.
 - Construction documents for early implementation public projects that have obtained funding.
 - Implement phase 1 of signage and wayfinding improvements.
- Long Term: 8+ years: These actions rely both on previous progress and also will initiate low priority projects. Examples include:
 - Continued planning and construction of public sector projects
 - Second and third phases of earlier construction projects
 - Continued grant writing, facility maintenance and administrative work.

Priority Recommendations

The Mount Penn Preserve Master Plan contains over 65 specific recommendations that include Physical Improvements, Events, Programming, Signage and Wayfinding, Information Management and Organization Structure. The Master Plan Team and the Executive and Steering Committee reviewed all of these recommendations and agreed on ten priority recommendations on which to initially focus.

These priority recommendations, presented in no particular order, are a mix of recommendation types. Some are big ideas while others are small but important steps to move the plan into implementation. These priorities were selected to provide a balance of initiative types that would also have a good chance of success and be catalysts for other actions. As additional Mount Penn Preserve initiatives evolve, these priorities are likely be revised based on community interest and specific funding opportunities. This priority list in no way prevents or is meant to discourage the Mount Penn Preserve Partnership from advancing other recommendations contained in the Master Plan.

Create The Mount Penn Preserve Partnership – The group should begin as an informal organization of local governments, non-profit organizations and private businesses. One of the first tasks of the Partnership will be to present the Master Plan to each local government's governing body, not as finished plan, but as a working document with a common vision. Initial goals for the Partnership will be to meet regularly to build working relationships, trust and cohesion toward achieving common goals and priorities. As the partnership evolves, a more formal structure may be appropriate. Several organizational models are referenced as examples in the Master Plan.

Communication Management / Information Dissemination — Over the short term, work with Visit Pennsylvania's Americana Region to be temporary caretakers of the Mount Penn Preserve Calendar and assist with the dissemination of information and events in the Mount Penn Preserve. Begin to explore the costs to establish, populate and maintain the Mount Penn Preserve Partnership Web site that will permanently take over the on-going task of the Mount Penn Events Calendar and information management. Once web site is established, create the Mount Penn Preserve App so that visitors to the Preserve can access information. Also, the Partnership should create strategic alliances with other regional recreation and tourist destinations to spread the word about the Mount Penn Preserve.

Boutique Hotel Request for Letters of Interest - Obtain City of Reading approvals to develop a non-binding Request for Letters of Interest (RFLOI) to develop a boutique hotel and restaurant at the William Penn Fire Tower site, which is the former site of a hotel. The new hotel would be modeled after The Nature Inn, a green facility, located at Bald Eagle State Park in Central Pennsylvania. This request to the private sector would help ascertain if there is a market for this facility and if there is interest in its' development. This low-cost task will help identify challenges (including utilities) associated with the hotel's development as well as a potential path forward for this destination facility.

Mineral Spring Hotel Building Request for Letters of Interest - Obtain City of Reading approvals to develop a non-binding Request for Letters of Interest (RFLOI) to utilize the former hotel building for several possible uses. Solicit letters of interest from restaurant, fraternal, and non-profit organizations. It is important to have a dynamic and viable

occupant of this historic structure that will add vitality to Mineral Spring Park while it provides eyes, ears and a visible presence in the park. This low-cost task will help identify challenges associated with the building's adaptive reuse as well as a potential path forward toward reimaging a new use for this community asset.

Pagoda Site Master Plan - Meet with DCNR & DCED representatives to explore ideas toward developing a master site plan for the Pagoda site that includes new parking and the development of an outdoor use area below the Pagoda. Include concept diagrams and a location for an "addition" to the Pagoda that would enhance the viability of the structure for events, exhibits and meetings. The master plan would identify site and infrastructure costs as well as examining possible locations for the new building. Prepare April and May 2018 Planning Grant applications to DCNR and DCED respectively for matching grants that would require little or no local funds (\$100,000.00 estimated cost). With successful grant applications, select a planning consultant in the spring of 2018 and complete the Master Plan by March 2019. Follow up with development grant applications toward Phase 1 site construction in 2021.

Create Stewardship Projects with Boys and Girls Club and Other Organizations - Reach out to the Boys and Girls Club, area colleges and universities, Berks County Conservation District and other educational and civic organization to work with area naturalists and conservation-minded professionals to identify stewardship projects on Mount Penn. Link projects to grade-level science curricula. Go beyond park clean-up projects and create real stewardship initiatives. Plan on multi-year programs to create future stewards of the Mount Penn Preserve.

Egelman's Park Master Plan (with a Dog Park ASAP) – Identified as a great but underutilized (and therefore perceived as unsafe) park; create a master plan for the facility that includes a dog park to attract a new user group to the park. Meet with area park managers and professionals to locate, plan, fund and construct the dog park. Prepare April and May '19 Planning Grant applications to DCNR / DCED for matching grants to fund the estimated \$50,000.00 planning costs. Complete the master plan in March 2021 and fund phase 1 construction in 2022.

Plan and Build New Trail Connections, Lower Alsace Township to the Preserve - Meet with property owners concerning possible trail easements to the park. Conduct feasibility assessment to determine routes and costs. Secure easements, develop plans, obtain funding and build trails. These connections will connect residential areas with the Preserve without motor vehicle use.

Rotary Park: Make Parking and Restrooms more available to the public - Work with Reading Area Little League and other partner organizations to make facilities more available to the public on nongame days. Explore solutions for surveillance, maintenance costs and safety.

Expand Municipal Policing on Mount Penn – Safety and perceptions of safety on Mount Penn were important discussions during the master planning. Initiate a dialogue among the Mount Penn Preserve Partnership about ways to increase the frequency of police patrols in the Preserve. Develop a memorandum of understanding among all parties about the intent to attain this goal. Explore creating a "Mount Penn Auxiliary" program modeled after the town watch model. Investigate funding options from public and private sector organizations and explore cost sharing ideas for expanded patrols.

Organizational Structure

While all of the local governments and non-profit organizations have played and continue to play important roles in the protection, preservation and enhancement of the Mount Penn Preserve, the lack of a unified vision for the Preserve has been a limitation to achieving the great potential that the Mount Penn Preserve holds. Each government organization has sought and obtained grants and / or has allocated funds from its budget to maintain or improve facilities on the Mountain. These efforts are to be lauded, despite the fact that each is largely accomplished within a context that does not consider the Mount Penn Preserve as a whole. However, despite these efforts, many facilities on the mountain continue to decline.

As funding agencies, foundations and individuals contribute towards facility or infrastructure improvements, they do so without understanding the effects of this work on the Preserve as a whole. What is the big picture? What is the ultimate vision for this priceless community resource?

There are some obvious deficiencies about several aspects of the idea that we call the Mount Penn Preserve that this master plan seeks to correct.

Unified Vision for the Mount Penn Preserve. This master plan is a start to creating a unified vision for the future of the Preserve. Ideas and recommendations contained in this master plan must be further refined and advanced toward implementation. There must be an organization, agency, person or entity to continue to move these ideas forward and to apply for grants, disseminate information, coordinate events, manage projects and perform a long list of tasks to keep this initiative from withering and dying. During master plan committee and public meetings, there appeared to be universal agreement that some entity or person(s) must be responsible for these many tasks. While many organizations deeply involved in the Mount Penn Preserve are run by volunteers, this is not a sustainable model for a Preserve-wide organization or entity.

Information Management. This master plan appears to have assembled for the first time an annual calendar of events that occur on the mountain. It has been assembled from multiple sources and it

is probably incomplete. Today, this information needs to be available instantaneously on-line for residents, day-trippers and tourists. Where do mountain bikers go for lunch? Where can trail runners enjoy a great meal after a big race? Where do I stay if I want to make a two-day mountain bike trail excursion? Who will develop, maintain, update and host a website for this information?

Events Coordination. There are many events held on the mountain each year. Oktoberfest, the Duryea Road Race, Easter Morning Services at the William Penn Memorial Fire Tower to name just a few. Each event must obtain permits and permissions from various local governments and agencies to provide for security, traffic control, parking, transportation, emergency services, fire protection, etc. Could there be a central clearinghouse or agency or individual who could streamline this process that might make this task less cumbersome for organizations and that would encourage other groups to initiate new events and festivals?

Competitive Funding Priorities. Each local government and non-profit group regularly seeks funding for various worthy projects. Each of these efforts is usually separate and completed in the vacuum of one agency and one project. This can be confusing to funding agencies and foundations who may ask, "How does this fit into the Preserve's big picture"? "How does the money we contribute this year dovetail with funding two years ago, or what we might contribute three years from now"? In order to seek larger grants and grants that have a high likelihood of continuation, The Mount Penn Preserve needs to develop not only a long term vision – which this master plan begins to accomplish – but also funding and project priorities that are Preserve-wide and multi-year. Additionally, most funders reward grant applicants that are multi-municipal or multi-agency since it shows intergovernmental cooperation and a regional approach to quality of life improvements.

Intergovernmental, Agency and Non-Profit Communication. One of the issues that become apparent during the master plan process was that there is inadequate communication among the many local governments, agencies and non-profits who maintain, enhance, utilize, and promote the Mount Penn Preserve. This is no one's fault – it is just that a mechanism for stakeholders to regularly communicate the challenges and successes that they each experience has never been established. This must change.

Allow for Private Sector Investment. If we learn nothing else from the colorful history of the Mount Penn Preserve, we need to remember that is was largely private sector businesses that created hotels, wineries, transportation infrastructure, restaurants and places of amusement. These for-profit businesses were the economic engines of the mountain and created the reasons why residents and tourists returned to the mountain over and over and over. The master plan proposes that there is a role today for new private sector investment in the Mount Penn Preserve. Grants and local governments alone cannot accomplish all of the heavy lifting that is necessary to create a critical mass of facilities and amenities on the mountain while its natural wonders are also preserved. There are countless examples of public-private partnerships in open space and parklands that accomplish these worthwhile objectives.

The Mount Penn Preserve Master Plan meeting discussions devoted significant time to the idea of establishing an umbrella organization that would coordinate the many activities and needs in the Mount Penn Preserve.

Honest skepticism was voiced about local governments "losing control" over their piece of the Mountain. Conversations about "what we would be losing" did occur. However, the voices about "what we would be gaining" were more numerous and there is real energy and excitement about the idea of a coordinated mountain-wide organization that can take this master plan and advance it to fruition.

Create the Mount Penn Preserve Partnership

The master plan strongly recommends that the project stakeholders create the Mount Penn Preserve Partnership. On the facing page, we have listed 8 organizations in the Commonwealth that were organized to coordinate the efforts of several agencies that have similar missions toward goals similar to those expressed in this master plan. Some of these organizations are municipal while others are non-profit.

Mount Penn Preserve stakeholders should schedule a series of meetings to discuss the most advantageous framework for this organization. We suggest that these meetings should begin in May of 2017 with the goal of having an organizational agreement by December 1, 2017.



Funding Strategies and Funding Sources

The key to creating a successful long term funding strategy for the Mount Penn Preserve includes the following actions:

- Cooperate as a partnership of organizations with a unified vision for the future of the Mount Penn Preserve;
- Agree to common fundraising goals for projects that are calendar specific and that plan into the future for at least five (5) years;
- Meet with funding agencies that are likely to be the subject of recurring applications from the Mount Penn Preserve Alliance.
 Some of these agencies are noted in this section of the report;
- Create a single point of contact or single agency that prepares grant applications on behalf of the Mount Penn Preserve Alliance to ensure continuity of messaging and content;
- Leverage funding sources against each other;
- Avoid utilizing local funds without leveraging these monies with matching grants;
- Update the five-year funding strategy annually to maintain accuracy and to incorporate new funding programs or opportunities into the plan;
- Create seamless opportunities for private sector investment in creating new desired amenities and facilities in the Mount Penn Preserve. Assist private sector interests to navigate through any zoning, regulatory or other obstacles toward creating these amenities.

The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania has several agencies that have

grant programs that could be applicable to projects in the Mount Penn Preserve. Finding the Green!, 2016-2017 (http://www.dcnr.state.pa.us/cs/groups/public/documents/document/dcnr_20028890.pdf) edition as compiled by the Pennsylvania Growing Greener Coalition lists many potential sources of funds. Rather than duplicate the information contained in the appendix, readers should consult this guide for detailed information.

Agencies that have grant programs that will be most applicable to the Mount Penn Preserve include:

- Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) through their Community Conservation Partnership Program (C2P2)
- Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) through the Commonwealth Finance Agency (CFA) and their Greenways, Recreation and Parks program.
- Pennsylvania Infrastructure Investment Authority (PennVEST) that offers both grants and low cost loans for waterrelated projects including wastewater systems, stormwater drainage, water quality and related issues.
- Pennsylvania Department of Environmental (DEP) for stormwater BMPs, Watershed protections grants, environmental education grants and others.
- Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT) through the Transportation Alternative Program (TAP), multimodal funds that are administered through various agencies.
- Marcellus Legacy Fund*, administered through Berks County.
- The Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program (RACP)
 for the construction of regional economic, cultural, civic,
 recreational, and historical improvement projects that promote
 economic development in the local economy.
- * Historically Marcellus Shale money has been utilized for capital improvements to County Parks. This money may not be available to municipalities and other organizations.

- 1. Kevin Barnhardt introduced the project and team. One of the emphases of the study will be bringing groups together.
- 2. Lee Olsen stated the Pagoda Foundation is committed to two (2) main points: no preconceived ideas and the final plan will not sit on desk and collect dust.
- 3. Peter Simone of Simone Collins (SC) gave a presentation on the overall study process. Pete discussed the schedule for project and how the first committee and public meeting will be run.
- 4. The plan includes all the different municipalities (City of Reading, Alsace Township, Lower Alsace Township, and Mt. Penn Borough) and Berks County.
- 5. A question was asked who would be responsible for implementing ideas from the final plan? Pete stated this might be an opportunity for a joint recreation authority. Ultimately each municipality might be responsible for select improvements within their jurisdiction.
- 6. Lee mentioned that a second charrette will be done to explore funding options. This charrette will be a peer review and look at when and how to fund.
- 7. A question was asked what is the organization that runs the preserve? Lee stated that maybe the Pagoda Foundation restructures itself and encompasses all of the preserve.
- 8. It was stressed that municipalities remain as active participants in the process.
- 9. SC distributed the survey to the Joint Committee. The Committee should email comments / revisions back by this Monday.

- 10. Pete reviewed some housekeeping items such as tables, chairs, extra rooms for breakout sessions, food options, etc. This will need to be worked out with the City and Berks County.
- 11. Kevin stated the project area extends beyond just the mountain. It also includes areas such as Carsonia Park, City Park, Antietam Lake Park, and more.
- 12. Pete stated that according to Corrie Crupi's Footprints on the Mountain book, which explores the history of Mountain Penn, there use to be many taverns and eating places available on and around the Mountain.
- 13. Pete stated that there might be opportunities for seasonal and pop-up events.
- 14. Pete mentioned that maybe there is weekend bus service to the Mountain.
- 15. SC will look at flat areas through a slope analysis of the Mountain for areas that might support development or events. An example would be for festivals.
- 16. It was mentioned that the preserve will need to attract State and private sector funding. The key question will be how to attract the private sector.
- 17. Corrie had presented about preserving the fire tower back in the 1990s.
- 18. It was stated that security will be a concern. There is currently a lot of bad and undesirable activity on the mountain. Generally more people is the best security measure.
- 19. It was suggested that a structure or organization needs to be in place to respect and protect the history of the preserve.
- 20. There was a general consensus to not allow the preserve to turn into a business district.
- 21. It was mentioned that roads do get used heavily throughout the mountain.
- 22. **SC** will distribute the poster to the committee. Kevin emphasized to the joint committee to share this information with anyone. Including through the use of social media.
- 23. Kevin stated that realistically it will probably be 10 years for real noticeable change to take place.
- 24. Pete stated that because of that, the study will look at early implementation projects. These would be small inexpensive projects that might utilize volunteers.
- 25. A member of Berks Nature spoke about lands throughout the mountain that is part of the Earl trust. This land was given to the city, but has restrictions on development. Berks Nature provided SC with maps of the trust parcels.
- 26.SC asked for the joint committee to RSVP regarding the morning car tour on February 24th. Pete stressed that attending the afternoon work session is most important.
- 27. The joint committee work session February 24th will be similar / identical to how the public work session on Saturday February 25th will be run.
- 28. Pete asked the committee to not assume the study team knows stuff. More information is better than less.

- 29. A question was asked about connecting to outside areas and how large of an area does this study include? Pete stated that the study team will look at how people get to the mountain from the region. This will include vehicular as well as pedestrian and bicycle connectivity. The study team will also look at a connections to Neversink Mountain.
- 30. Rich name stated that on Saturday April 22nd there will be a clean-up on the mountain. The city provides some equipment (brush hog, etc) and the group usually gets about 30 volunteers. Rich stated that more volunteers means more clean-up capability. SC will promote this. The clean-up effort meets at the old city recycling center (13th and Lombard street) at 830 am.
- 31. The city's capacity to take care of the mountain is limited. Volunteers are necessary.
- 32. Free parking will be available starting February 24th at the Double Tree parking




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

- 1. Pete reviews the project background and the progress so far.
- 2. Rotary Park is used for sports leagues. It is owned by the city, and managed by the city. The parking lot should be open more often, and the bathrooms should be open more often.
- 3. A coordination app would be a great asset for Mt Penn. It is very expensive to advertise with the visitor's bureau. An app would be a single location for people looking for events on the mountain, or information about history, where to eat, and trails on the mountain.
- 4. The Pagoda Skyline Inc. has been working for a year to get the Fire Tower refurbished with added restrooms. They approached private vendors to do so.
- 5. Donors are reluctant to invest money in improvements. Peter Simone: Many times donors are hesitant because they want to see a master plan to know that their money is used wisely.
- 6. A Mt Penn Preserve central organizational structure comprised of municipalities would be valuable in managing the preserve. Individual groups are sometimes reluctant to get involved because they are aware of what they may lose. Municipalities would need to be reminded of what they would gain from such a partnership. Organizations can restrict development.

- 7. A Mt Penn Preserve Collective with all factions of those involved with the Preserve represented could break out into topic groups during meetings to discuss events, and organization.
- 8. Train service between Reading and Philly tourists would create a loop of tourists: people would visit Reading and Reading residents could travel efficiently.
- 9. An obstacle will be to overcome the distrust of the county in the community. Commissioner Bernhardt: The County supports the efforts of the committee on the project and they want to see it thrive.
- 10. There are few others besides the county who have the capacity to manage Mt Penn Preserve. Reading Recreation Commission is great but this project might be too large for them to handle, and this project is outside of their charge. The Recreation Commission of the Antietam Valley is too small to take on a project of this size.
- 11. Great Allegheny passage brought tourism to suffering towns because they were forced to work together and set a vision and priorities.
- 12. There are mechanisms and vehicles are available to pull together commissions or entities around a central idea and have a set of rules the follow, such as the Delaware River Basin Commission. We are not asking people to give something up, instead we are asking them what can we all gain?
- 13. There should be an umbrella group to oversee and market the preserve (LLC-DRBC). This could be an opportunity for conflicting groups to work through past issues for the good of the Preserve.
- 14. Because the mountain is a regional destination, there should be a vote to put county money into these projects.
- 15. Be good neighbors and respect private property owners within the Preserve.
- 16. The project should establish priorities and a clear vision for the mountain. One priority is to focus on the first steps to give people manageable goals to pursue.
- 17. The Preserve needs horse trailer parking in a safe location away from bicycle or car traffic.
- 18. Promote trail etiquette between pedestrians, horse riders, and cyclists.
- 19. Control unauthorized trail construction, and maintain viable trails with erosion control.



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



- 1. Pete reviewed the project background and the progress so far.
- 2. Simone Collins' plan over next 9 days is to finalize the plan and present it to the public on April 20th.
- 3. Shannon Rossman stated the name of the organization could be Mount Penn Preserve Partnership. There was a lot of discussion. This name was agreed to by those in attendance.
- 4. Pete noted that the plan should be presented to the governing bodies of each municipality and the full board of County Commissioners.
- 5. The Partnership could be relatively informal at first, with a more formal structure as the group evolves.
- 6. Shannon stated the organization is really a private/public partnership.
- 7. Pete stated that the group could work with Crystal Seitz of the Americana Visitors Bureau to handle initial Mount Penn Events listing.
- 8. Pete stated that the Partnership should determine the costs to set up and populate and maintain a website. An app could follow.
- 9. Kevin stated that pushing for things now, like a hotel, is better than waiting. If we delay, the idea could be lost.

- 10. Kevin suggested a new name for the defunct "East End Athletic Club". We agreed to call it Mineral Spring Hotel Building.
- 11. The Partnership should work with the City of Reading and the other municipalities on priorities when seeking public grant funding.
- 12. It was stated that there is not presently a 5 year capital improvement plan for the Pagoda.
- 13. Lee stated that the Pagoda Foundation needs to expand fundraising.
- 14. A master plan for the Pagoda site (as proposed by the draft master plan) might be a help fundraising to improve the building.
- 15. Corrie Crupi stated phase 1 should be the building expansion and parking. It was agreed that a Pagoda area site master plan should include the idea of a building addition so that the new building can be located and utility costs can be estimated. It was agreed that infrastructure will need to be studied with any proposed site improvements.
- 16. Pete stated that the priority list that SC created is not numbered and does not prioritize the priorities.
- 17. Mike Reinert, President of Pagoda-Skyline, Incorporated, stated that Pagoda-Skyline has seed money for a history museum, but the money needs to be used for that purpose.
- 18. Pagoda building maintenance might be a part of the master plan. Maintenance is a substantial cost.
- 19. Lee Olsen suggested that valet parking could be used for events at the Pagoda. Cars could be parked at the Fire Tower or some other remote site.
- 20. Pete mentioned the idea of partnering with the Boys and Girls Clubs for programming or volunteer work tasks in the Preserve. This could create stewards for the Preserve well into the future. Jen Brooks is doing various partnership programs at Angora Fruit Farm, and should be able to do that with the Boys and Girls Club. Penn State Extension is doing a watershed project, which may be another institution to partner with for volunteer projects. There may be others.
- 21. The Preserve master plan recommends a Master Plan at Egelman's Park with a proposed dog park as an early implementation project. Dog Parks are relatively low cost to implement.
- 22. Pete discussed the trail connection priority. The property owner between Lower Alsace and Berks County Earl Trust land is potentially open to a trail easement. The other trail connection discussed is along an old road from Lower Alsace to Antietam Lake. Kevin stated this could be a connection to the caretaker's house, which is being taken down and converted to an overlook.
- 23. The recommendations of police surveillance in the Preserve should be a high priority. Kevin stated getting to and from the mountain takes time for the police. There could be an agreement that monitoring the Preserve would be rotated amongst municipalities. There was an agreement to revise the recommendation to expand County Ranger program to a wider, multi-municipal effort to increase police surveillance in the Preserve.
- 24. There was a suggestion to start a Main Street program at 23rd Street and Perkiomen Ave, and along Carsonia Ave. This could help promote the Preserve. Related suggestions to build a visitor's center or a kiosk at the base of the mountain. Pete stated that the recommendation for

- signage and wayfinding may address some of these concerns for better visibility for the Preserve.
- 25. The County is planning to submit a grant to update the Park and Recreation Plan in 2018. Could be bundled potentially with the proposed trail connections?
- 26. There is a fear by some of the open water at Egelman's Park. The lake is deeper than the one at Carsonia.
- 27. Lower Alsace tried to buy Egelman's Park but the City never sold the park
- 28. Lee said one of the previously planned "next steps" after the Preserve Master Plan, is to do a peer to peer program with DCNR. They would help determine how to work with the plan and accomplish it over time. This will answer the question "now what?" DCNR could help inform what kind of organization this should be. Pete will contract DCNR.
- 29. Pete stated that the DCNR C2P2 program has separate money pots for non-profits and local governments. They give more money to local governments.
- **30.** Is there a potential of shutting down skyline drive? Has this idea been thought about? **This will** be added to the master plan recommendations and is an operational issue.
- **31.** Security cameras at the Fire Tower and Pagoda could be hooked into City Hall's security as an added safety measure. **This should be added to the plan recommendations.**
- 32. Police seem unwilling to go after petty crime when it is reported in the Preserve, since they have more pressing serious crime issues.
- 33. SC will add a Master Plan recommendation about enforcing quality of life crime issues.
- 34. The Partnership needs to encourage people to call the police over and over again.
- 35. It was stated that positive activity in the Preserve discourages negative activity.
- 36. Kevin asked if the top 10 suggested priorities was informed by the dots placed by meeting attendees at Public Meeting #2. Pete stated that SC reviewed the recommendations and dots and prioritized recommendations based on professional experience to produce a priority list that has both long term and short term projects and both low cost and more expensive initiatives.
- 37. SC to update survey monkey results in report.
- 38. A Velodrome complex might be constructed near the Preserve on the Albright College Campus.
- 39. Part of the presentation on April 20th should be done by executive committee member(s) as a symbolic hand–off from the consultant team to the community. This could be Lee, Kevin, or Shannon.
- 40. The Committee will need to address questions at the final public meeting.
- 41. The Committee should get this plan in front of governing bodies and discuss steps about moving the plan forward.
- 42. The Committee should establish internal meeting dates to move the plan forward.
- 43. Corrie said a new group has emerged to use the mountain, a Soap Box Derby. They want to close Skyline Drive around the Fire Tower and use it for events. They will be at the next Public Meeting.

- 44. The idea of periodically closing Preserve roads was brought up. This has been discussed at meetings. This should be in the master plan as an operational issue / suggestion.
- 45. SC will get all files to the County when completed so the County can continue to revise and update the plan.
- 46. Pete asked if the committee wants to announce actual meetings for the future partnership at the public meeting on April 20th? The Committee should let SC know in the next couple days.





- 1. Lee Olsen introduced the meeting and thanked everyone for their hard work over the past year to move forward the Mount Penn Preserve. He stressed that the master plan report "will not sit on a shelf collecting dust" but that it will be the tool towards the next steps of implementation. Special thanks were made to the Reading-Berks Association of Realtors, Berks County and the City of Reading for their time spent on the planning process including Shannon Rossman, Linda Kelleher, Wesley Stefanick, and Kevin Barnhardt.
- 2. Peter S. presented the PowerPoint presentation reviewing the master plan process and the top ten priority recommendations. He stated that priorities are not ranked in a specific order but are a selection of some easily attainable goals, strong communities needs, and big idea projects. He noted that priorities can and will change over the years and the planning process must remain opportunistic and match priorities to available funding programs. Following the presentation he floor was opened to questions.
- 3. John King of the Reading Gravity Racing League (Soap Box Derby) stated that his organization is currently in the process of planning their first race on along Oak Lane for Father's Day; they are working with Lower Alsace Township to obtain permits.
 - a. He stated that the original soap box derby races date back to 1976 and where held on Spuhler Lane. He noted that he has been in contact with the mayor to explore the idea of restoring the pavement along Spuhler Lane for use for gravity enthusiasm sports. Current estimates for the road repair are \$35,000
 - b. He requested that the recommendation to repair this road for the use of The Gravity Racing League be added to the report.
- 4. Alyson Hutter inquired if there is a hierarchy of trails currently on the mountain. She also stated that as a Reading High school and Kutztown University Graduate

she feels it is important that the Mount Penn Preserve look to the greater county for partners.

- a. It was noted that the current trails plans developed by BAMBA do denote a hierarchy of trails for all users groups, not just mountain bikers. Shannon Rossman stated that the County has utilized the BAMBA trail map and added it to the County GIS mapping.
- b. Kevin Barnhardt noted that the steering committee is open to all and they need more members to become involved and to join the committee. Shannon R. noted that often a specific recommendation needs a given volunteer to champion that cause.
- 5. Hoiner Willams inquired why the plan recommendation shifted the added security for the Preserve from the County Ranger system to the municipal police force.
 - a. Kevin B. noted that the County Rangers do not have enforcement power and that the state does not allow rangers to have policing authority. He noted that County Sheriffs are encouraged to travel over the mountain when serving warrants
 - It was noted that the City of Reading has Mount Penn as part of a patrol district.
- 6. Hoiner Willams stated his concern that the ideas generated for the master plan originated from a select group of people.
 - a. Pete S. stated that all ideas were generated from the public that attended planning meetings and participated in the online opinion survey in a transparent process.
 - b. Shannon R. stressed that the master plan only identifies desired concepts nothing is set in stone in this plan.
- 7. Hoiner Willams stated that grant funding is often limited to capital improvements and not for maintenance of improvements. He stated the frustration of seeing Engelman Park improvements decline due to deferred maintenance.
 - a. Kevin B. agreed with the concern stating that long term plans should look towards sustainable improvements noting that there is a lot of hard work ahead to keep the community involved to move forward and create a longterm plan.
- 8. Marcia Goodman-Hinnershitz thanked all those who have worked on the process and attended public meetings from both sides of the mountain, with a particular thanks to the younger participants.
 - a. She suggested that the master plan for the Pagoda should be revisited the first phase is completed but the second and third phase recommendations should be reviewed and updated as required.
 - b. She also challenged everyone involved in the process to get out and walk the trails and be a part of what is happening.
- 9. Samantha Colombo stated the importance that the mountain be accessible to all user groups and was concerned that the meeting attendees did not reflect the demographics of the surrounding area.
 - a. It was noted that City and County staff had reached out to the Hispanic center as well as translated meeting notices. We would welcome additional ideas on how to encourage attendance.

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- b. Lee O. stated that the demographics of Reading have changed but the city still "has the good bones of a city". He noted that Reading will never be what it was but that moving forward it is important to create a safe, clean, vibrant city for all its people. He stressed the importance for people to be a part of the community and, get more involved.
- 10. Kevin Lerch inquired what would be the ongoing role of the two committees and how would they carry on into the next steps.
 - a. Kevin B. recommended monthly meetings of the executive committee, comprised of representatives of the local municipalities; and quarterly meetings of the steering committee are held. More input from the community is needed to keep the ball moving
 - b. Lee O. suggested that some of the next steps would involve organizing the committee structure, to create subcommittees within steering committee to focus on moving forward key recommendations.
- 11. Rebecca Reppert noted the importance of getting more young people involved in activities on the mountain. She suggested simple ways to engage people such as brining friends to the spring clean-up or the Fire Tower BBQ fund raiser. She noted that there is legacy of volunteerism on the mountain and this spirit needs to be carried forward.
- 12. The proposed velodrome site near Albright College was discussed and the importance that it link to the mountain. New visitors to the area will be looking for activities.
- 13. It was noted that moving forward there will need to address and resolve potential usage conflicts.
- 14. It was stated that the excitement for Mount Penn Preserve is heading in the right direction. It is important that this excitement reaches out the grade / high school / college students
- 15. It was noted that in the short term the Mount Penn Preserve Activities Schedule will be maintained by the Visitor Bureau; but that in the long term this schedule should be set up on a separate web site. Eventually, maintaining this information may require a specific staff position.
- 16. Tom McMahon acknowledged the work to preserve Antietam Lake undertaken by Tommy Worth and Marcia Goodman-Hinnershitz 12 years ago, and how it has help to lead to today's Mt Penn Preserve Master Plan.
 - a. He stated that the Pagoda Foundation is exploring some functional changes such as including an information center to create a central location for information to the community.
 - b. He noted that inclusion is a big concern for the process moving forward. He warned however to not look past a good idea due to the fear that people did not show up to be part of the process.
 - c. He mentioned the importance of grassroots processed such as Pennies for the Pagoda to help establish local buy in and support.
- 17. Linda Minotto stated that she lived on Haag Road and expressed concern that she had not been aware of the planning process until now. She is worried that proposed improvements will have a negative impact on day to day life on the mountain.

- a. It was noted that announcements for the meetings included newspaper, television, municipal websites, social media and posted flyers. However it is always difficult to reach everyone.
- b. It was noted that for Social Media the handle #MtPennPreserve had been created to help promote the preserve and the planning process.
- 18. James Oswald stated that using the word "preserve" suggests maintaining in the original or existing state. He stressed concerns that too much was being proposed in the Preserve. He expressed concern in the feasibility of a Hotel at the fire tower and felt it would conflict with current uses such as the road races. He noted concern that the current investment of the road paving and how construction of a new hotel would adversely affect the roads improvements.
 - a. Lee O. stated that the Request for Letters of Interest was a first step to see if a hotel is even economically feasible. He cited the example of the downtown Double Tree Hotel being a 10 years process from the Market Study to finish building; meaning there would be a period of 5-7years before there was construction along Skyline Drive if any.
 - b. Kevin B. stated that the overall philosophy of the master plan is to get more people onto the mountain and to create safe activity locations. The feasibility study would need to address how the hotel would work with the hill climb and existing infrastructure.
 - c. John King noted that the Fire Tower area is listed as a parks and recreation space and they had spoken with the Mayor Scott to make improvements for the Soap box Derby in this area. He stated that Mayor Scott has approved "doing what is needed" up there for the derby. John K. asked for clarification on the ownership and management of this area.
 - i. Marcia G. stated that the area is owned by the City but is located in Lower Alsace Township.
- 19. Crystal Seitz stated that she grew up in Stoney Creek in Alsace Township and runs the Visitors Bureau. She noted that the master plan gives control to all of us to pick and choose the recommendations that we want to move forward. She stated that the Earl Pool Bird Sanctuary is not far from Mount Penn Preserve.
- 20. Rich Rock stated that the preserve cleanup is on Saturday at 8:30am

READNG, Pa. - At the Berks County commissioners' weekly board meeting on Thursday, Commissioner Kevin S. Barnhardt invited the community to attend one of <u>four community design meetings</u> scheduled for February and March.

The purpose of the meetings is to brainstorm ideas and to get input from the public to help create a Mount Penn Preserve master plan.

"We want to get everyone's perspective." Barnhardt said.

After the commissioners' meeting, Barnhardt shared that they are in the preliminary stages of the plan and that the final strategic plan may not include radical changes, but simply address ways to preserve and enhance the facilities on Mount Penn.

"Many groups have been working independently" to improve the area, Barnhardt said. This is an effort to "combine forces."

Barnhardt also shared that better recreational facilities help improve the quality of life for Berks County residents.

"The remoteness of the area is both a blessing and a curse," and said bringing more activity to the area will make it a safer place, He admitted.

The Mount Penn Preserve executive committee has representatives from Alsace and Lower Alsace townships, Mount Penn Borough, Reading, the Reading Berks Association of Realtors, Pagoda-Skyline Inc., and Berks County. The Reading Liederkranz, Stokesay Castle, and Captain's Cove have also been involved in the discussions.

The meetings are scheduled for Saturday, February 25, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. or 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. at Reading City Hall; Thursday, March 9, from 4 p.m. until 6 p.m. or 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. at the Reading Liederkranz in Lower Alsace Township; Saturday, March 25, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. or 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. at Reading City Hall; or Thursday, April 20, from 7 p.m. until 9 p.m. at Stokesay Castle and the Knight's Pub in Lower Alsace Township.

Kelly's Korner: Fans envision a bigger role for Reading's mountains

Every now and then it feels good to daydream about things that might be.

I caught myself doing that the other day when I was talking to Reading architect Lee C. Olsen about the Mount Penn Preserve.

For the uninitiated, Mount Penn Preserve is a notion of fans of Mount Penn, Reading and Berks County who want to develop the Pagoda and other amenities on Mount Penn and Neversink Mountain.

Parks, lakes, bars and restaurants, walking, hiking and biking trails and other uses for the natural resources of the city and suburbs all could be included in the concept.

Olsen and county Commissioner Kevin S. Barnhardt are spearheading a communitywide exploration of what the future of the Pagoda and environs might be. They held the first of four public meetings on Saturday, Feb. 25, in City Hall.

About 25 people brainstormed on that Saturday morning in City Council chambers about how to make Mount Penn a flourishing cultural and economic destination.

Ideas ranging from simple things like litter clean-ups to Mayor Wally Scott's dream of having a cable car up to the Pagoda, were aired.

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"There is so much potential," said Olsen, who is an architect and president of the Pagoda Foundation.

The first session was intended to gather ideas from the general public and from folks who use the mountain on a regular basis, whether it's to hike, bike, walk their dogs, or other diversions. The goal is the development of a master plan.

The next meeting is set for Thursday, March 9, at the Reading Liederkranz, 143 Spook Lane. The second session will be used to present initial design concepts and have further discussion and feedback. A draft master plan will be presented at the third meeting on Saturday, March 25, back in City Hall.

The fourth and final meeting will be held on Thursday, April 20, at Stokesay Castle and Knight's Pub, 141 Stokesay Castle Lane. The plan right now is for a final master plan to be presented at the Stokesay meeting.

While Olsen and I were talking about the Mount Penn Preserve, I said I thought there was room for a rectangular building behind the Pagoda. The area already is hollowed out and about a story and a half below Skyline Drive and the parking area next to the Pagoda.

"You could put a two-story rectangular building back there and no one could even see it," I said.

Olsen could barely contain himself. Back in 2005 during the Pagoda Pennies fundraising program, Olsen created a drawing of what an annex or addition to the symbolic edifice might look like.

Olsen isn't the only one with a vision for how the Pagoda and Mount Penn could be developed. Both Olsen and Barnhardt have ideas about how they would like to see what may be the county's biggest asset developed.

When they say developed, they don't mean dividing the mountainside overlooking Reading and Lower Alsace Township into parcels and

putting in single homes, condominiums and apartments. And they don't mean putting in a strip shopping center on Skyline Drive.

What they're talking about is something like a Pagoda conference center. Something that would attract people to the area. An annex building could house a Pagoda museum, shops, a bar and restaurant and a walkway from the second floor of the annex building to the Pagoda.

"It's why I play the lottery," Barnhardt said. "So, I can give someone \$3 million or whatever it takes and ask them to build it.'

LOWER ALSACE TWP., Pa. - The second set of community design meetings for the Mount Penn Preserve master plan was held at the Reading Liederkranz Thursday evening.

Approximately 30 people attended each meeting, held at 4 p.m. and 7 p.m. and provided their input on the future of the Mount Penn Preserve.

According to Sarah Leeper of Simone Collins Landscape Architecture, there were approximately 30 people at each of the first two meetings, which were held February 25.

Leeper said Thursday evening's meetings were about presenting those ideas and concepts and getting more input from the public.

Simone Collins Landscape Architecture's Peter Simone, also of Simone Collins Landscape Architecture, led the meeting and explained that the study area covers about 4,000 acres. He said to help organize the ideas, they've broken the area down to five zones: Skyline, Gravity Railroad Trail, Antietam, Central Mountain, and Mountain Village.

Simone summarized the information discovered from the first meetings, saying, "The first series of meetings generated more than 450 ideas. There were lots of good thoughts and ideas and a great diversity of opinions."

"Some people wanted more trails," Simone said. "Some people wanted a hotel on the mountain. Some wanted more restaurants. Connections were a big thing; how do we get to the mountain more easily?"

Simone said some of the goals of the plan included low-impact design and regional economic development.

Simone then presented the results of the online survey, which is available online until April 10. According to Simone, 235 people have taken the survey so far.

The following are some of the questions and the responses that have been received:

1. In the past 24 months (2 years), has any member of your household participated or been a spectator in any of the following events/activities in the Mount Penn complex? The events that received the most responses were the Duryea Hillclimb,

- Duryea Downhill, Liederkranz Octoberfest, various running events, and a private event at Stokesay.
- 2. If you or a member of your household has not visited the Mount Penn Preserve recently, or if you visit infrequently, what are the reasons that you do not visit? The number one response was "I do not feel safe there."
- 3. If you could create or recommend any types of new or improved facilities in the Mount Penn Complex, what facilities would you recommend? The most popular facilities included improved trails and more restrooms.

Then, Simone turned to the audience and asked if the project were to move forward in a unified way, what type of structure would they feel make the most sense.

One person who has been involved in the restoration of the fire tower said that funding is the biggest issue he sees moving forward. Another expressed his concern about the various entities, including municipalities and the county trusting each other and working together.

Simone agreed that this is a common problem, but if they can show the individual entities what they have to gain from working together, that it can work.

People were then asked to look at the list of ideas (that included everything from a zip line to more parking) and place a dot next to the items that were of interest to them.

Leeper said that they will present their recommendations at the next set of meetings, scheduled for Saturday, March 25 at Reading City Hall. Those recommendations will be available to view online, with the final plan being presented at the April 20 meeting at Stokesay Castle. The public is invited to
