Welcome & Introductions

Chairperson Ignazio Sabella called the meeting to order at 1506. The meeting was held in person at 2561 Bernville Road and also virtually via Teams meeting.

EHS / Tier II Submission Status

Megan Young-Kraft reported that the PATTS application had a failure the day before reporting was due. The state then extended the reporting deadline. Several facilities assumed this applied to the county as well. They were advised it did not and the county deadline is still March 1st. As there are no late fees, this was of little issue.

Updates to our Tier II manager that took place last year have made the planning review process easier. More plans have been submitted and they are now able to be viewed in a .pdf draft. Admins are also able to change the municipalities and first due fire departments of facilities.

297 Tier II reports have been submitted for report year 2021. Income from 2021 fees so far is \$65,825. There were 9 new facilities added.

Hazmat Team Report

Phil Salamone reported 10 responses by the county spill trailers with the following

breakdown: Mt. Penn: 2 Shillington: 2 Hamburg: 1 Walnuttown: 1 Hereford: 0 Rehersburg:1

The full hazmat team was dispatched on February 8th to Amity Township to assist local fire departments and a spill trailer with an overturned tractor-trailer with a ruptured tank of home heating oil. Operations-level assistance was provided to stop the leak, and the team stood-by on scene as electric crews worked to secure entangled power lines while the trailer was up righted.

The hazmat team trained in identification of unknowns in January, radiological transportation incidents in February, and a level A dress out at a simulated tanker leak in March. New communications equipment is being purchased; microphones and radios will now be integrated into a helmet.

A fire department is still being sought to house the second county foam trailer.

The question was asked regarding the county foam trailers and the use of PFAS in the foam on the county trailers and volunteer fire departments. The foam purchased by the county and distributed to the foam trailers does not have PFAS, and fire departments can no longer purchase foam with PFAS in it.
